#### Question:

With regard to the work of abating environmental nuisances relating to dripping air-conditioners and water seepage and cleaning up environmental hygiene blackspots, please provide information on the following:

- 1. the resources and manpower to be provided for handling cases of dripping air-conditioners in 2018-19, the number of cases to be handled and their distribution by district, whether all the cases have been settled, as well as the number of and reason(s) for unsettled cases;
- 2. the resources and manpower available for handling cases of water seepage in 2018-19, the number of cases to be handled and their distribution by district, whether all the cases have been settled, as well as the number of and reason(s) for unsettled cases; and
- 3. the provision and manpower to be provided for cleaning up environmental hygiene blackspots in 2018-19, the number of blackspots and their distribution by district, whether all the blackspots have been cleaned up, as well as the number of and reason(s) for outstanding cases.

<u>Asked by</u>: Hon CHAN Han-pan (Member Question No. (LegCo use): 35) <u>Reply</u>:

1.&2. In 2017, 26 055 complaints against water dripping from air-conditioners were received by the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department (FEHD), and 36 002 complaints against water seepage received by the Joint Offices (JO) of the Buildings Department (BD) and FEHD. The breakdown of complaints received and handled by district in 2017 is at Annex I.

The cause of water seepage in building is complicated. In handling reports on water seepage, JO will conduct a series of non-destructive tests. JO endeavours to handle each water seepage case promptly. However, the time required for processing a

water seepage case depends on the case's complexity and the owners/occupants' Since the circumstances of individual cases vary, the time taken for co-operation. investigation may also differ widely. In relatively straight-forward cases, where the source of water seepage could be identified by JO staff during initial site inspection, the cases can normally be concluded within a short period of time. For more complicated cases which may, for instance, involve multiple sources or intermittent water seepage, JO staff will have to conduct different or repeated tests or on-going investigations and monitoring in order to ascertain the cause. Where vacant units or un-cooperative owners/occupants are involved, JO would have to apply to the Court for entry warrants in order to carry out investigations. These cases would take more The time required for processing water dripping from air-conditioners cases time. also varies from case to case depending on, among other things, the nature and complexity of the cases and whether the relevant owners and occupants are cooperative.

At present, about 318 Health Inspectors in FEHD are deployed to 19 district environmental hygiene offices across the territory to handle environmental hygiene issues, including handling environmental hygiene complaints such as water dripping from air-conditioners. There is no separate breakdown on the manpower and expenditure involved in handling such complaints. As the nuisances caused by water dripping from air-conditioners tend to cluster in the summer months, there is usually a substantial increase in the workload during the same period. To reduce the work pressure of frontline officers, FEHD recruited a team of 30 contract staff in the summer of 2017 to enhance education and enforcement actions, focusing on buildings located in blackspots where the problem of water dripping from air-conditioners persists. In 2018, FEHD intends to enlarge the team size by recruiting 40 contract staff to help handle the substantial increase of complaints on water dripping from air-conditioners.

3. FEHD receives environmental hygiene complaints from members of the public pinpointing multiple channels, including reports through locations with FEHD will conduct investigation and take unsatisfactory hygiene conditions. measures to abate the nuisance. Depending on the circumstances prevailing at individual locations, FEHD will adjust the frequency of street washing and pest control operations and step up enforcement action as appropriate. There is no hard and fast definition of what a hygienic "black spot" is; the term is used to refer to an area where the cleanliness problem remains obstinate despite enhanced cleansing. A list of the top 5 locations in each of the 19 districts, as in March 2018, to which FEHD devotes more efforts and resources in tackling the problem of illegal dumping of refuse is set out in Annex II. FEHD does not keep separate breakdown on the expenditure and manpower serving the locations identified as hygiene blackspots.
