## Question:

The estimate under Programme (2) Environmental Hygiene and Related Services increases by \$963.8 million or 19.5% as compared with that in 2019-20. According to the Department, this is mainly due to the creation of new posts. Please advise this Committee on the following:

- 1. What are the details of the new posts, including the programmes, ranks, job natures and salaries involved?
- 2. Will the Department increase its manpower establishment or estimated expenditure due to the novel coronavirus epidemic? If yes, what are the details? If no, what are the reasons?

## Reply:

1) There will be a net increase of 56 posts under Programme (2) in the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department in 2020-21. The information of all the posts proposed to be created is as follows:

2) In 2020-21, the Department will, based on operational needs, deploy in-house and service contractors' resources for the anti-epidemic work against Coronavirus Disease 2019. The estimated expenditure for street cleansing service contracts is \$2.15 billion, representing an increase of \$500 million (about 30%) as compared to 2019-20 and including the provision for more street cleansing workers, mini-street washing vehicle teams and public toilet deep cleansing teams.

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
